ISSUE DATES OF #521 BASE BALL SERIES, - By Walter E. Corson

The dates of issue of the three series of #521 are difficult to determine exactly, but after considerable research I find many instances where approximate dates can be determined. For instance, Wid Conroy was transferred from the New York Americans to Washington on Feb. 17th 1909. This date can be safely stated as being the earliest issue date of the 150 series as Conroy is shown as a Washington player in the 150 series. If these cards were issued prior to Feb. 17, 1909 Conroy would have been with the New York Americans on the card.

There are two identical cards for G. Brown; one in the 150 series with the Chicago Nationals and the other in the 350 series with Washington. Brown was transferred from Chicago to Washington on May 12, 1909. So it appears that the 150 series did not extend much beyond that date. On the other hand, Neal Ball is shown with two different teams. Cards showing the N.Y. Amer. were issued both in the 150 and 350 series. Ball went from N.Y. to Cleveland on May 17, 1909 which certainly shows that the change from the 150 to the 350 series was made before May 17th. This is shown conclusively in the case of "Bad Bill" Burns of the Chicago White Sox who came to them from Washington in a trade on May 16, 1909. The card for Burns was issued in the 350 series showing definitely that the 350 series could NOT have started before May 16, 1909 and, as we have seen in the Ball case, since they WERE issued before May 17th I naturally conclude that the 350 series was begun on May 16, 1909.

In the same manner, the change from the 350 to the 350-460 series is shown. On Oct. 27, 1909 Dahlen was sent from the Boston Nationals to Brooklyn. There are two identical cards for Dahlen. The card showing Boston was issued in both the 150 and 350 series which proves all the above statements. The card showing Brooklyn was issued in both the 350 and the 350-460 series which shows nothing new except that the 350 series was still being used on Oct. 27, 1909. However, the earliest date of issue of the 350-460 series must be Dec. 16, 1909 since on that date Lake and Demmitt were traded by the N.Y. Americans to the St. Louis Amer. for Lou Criger. To substantiate that fact Lake of St. Louis was issued in the 350 series as well as in the 350-460 series so the more correct date would be sometime during the early part of 1910, since we see that the 350 series was still being used on Dec. 16, 1909. The 350-460 series was still being issued on April 6, 1910 as witness the case of McIntire (spelled McIntyre on card) of Brooklyn and also the card stating "Brooklyn and Chicago". McIntire changed from Brooklyn to Chi. on April 6, 1910. In summary, I conclude that the 150 series began shortly after Feb. 17, 1909 and continued until May 16, 1909 when the 350 series started and ran up into early 1910, when the 350-460 series began.

Other Notes on the series: In addition to the McIntire mentioned above, there are misspellings of Meyers, N.Y.N. who is spelled Myers twice; Nicholls, Phila A, misspelled Nichols; and Willett, Detroit, spelled Willette. The MONTGOMERY team belongs in the Southern League as they played there from 1903 to 1914 during the issue of these cards, and were in the South Atlantic League for only a part of the 1916 season. There never was a Doolin for Phila. Nat but the 1907 Reach Guide so spelled the name and it appears on one card. It is Mike Doolan. The error is also made and corrected in the Extra Large #514 cards. ELLAM played for Birmingham when these cards were issued and not for Nashville. The HELM error has already been noted in the Bulletin. There may be others similar. (Mr. Corson's notes on the #520 and #522 series will appear soon. - Ed.)

MY UNCLE JAKE - By C.G.M.

My Uncle Jake Myers was a sporty old bachelor of the Eighties and Nineties who was quite a popular character in Chicago. He owned five saloons and three cigar stores patronized largely by the boys about town as well as out of town visitors. Everybody knew Jake; he spent one day successively in each of his places and made it a point to meet the public at each - often waiting on trade the entire day himself.

He was seldom seen without a big cigar in his mouth until he suddenly changed to cigarettes and the old "Richmond Straight Cuts" put out by Allen & Ginter were his favorites. For some reason or other he became intensely interested in the little colored card photo pictures that came in the packages and he instructed all his help to gather all that were left on the counters and cases as well as on the floor (if they were clean) in all of his places and send them over to his Number One store at State and Madison every Monday by the distributing wagon.

As my uncle got older and his activity cut down to where he paid but short visits to his places, he gave more time to fooling over his cards. He put in almost every brand that furnished the best cards and raised Hell with every branch manager that did not kick in with a good bunch of cards once a week, and it got around that Jake was getting goofy on the subject. He never made any effort to sort them out but just pawed over them and packed them away in boxes and barrels which soon clogged up his office and storerooms to the extent that he had a big place fixed up in the attic where it was arranged into large bins in which thousands and thousands of cigarette, tobacco, and coffee cards as well as tobacco tags, old stamps on envelopes, old copper coins, etc were thrown indiscriminately together.

When Uncle Jake passed on in the year 1901 the places of business were all closed except the No. 1 store and one of the saloons over on Randolph. Two favorite nephews, Ike and Joe Myers, carried on the business until last year when both died within two months of another. Out of respect for Old Jake, they would never allow the stuff up in the attic to ever be touched by anyone. 19th vs. 20th U.S. Tobaccos.

There has been a tendency in some quarters to consider our 20th Tobacco issues as somewhat inferior to the earlier 19th. We think it is carried farther than the facts justify. Age lends enchantment, it is true, but on the basis of scarcity, any general collector will tell you that the 20th stack up pretty evenly with the 19th. In both groups there are a dozen or so sets fairly easy to complete and at the other end of the line a long string of sets of which no collector will have more than a few, if any. The trick of collecting 20th, however, is to get them all in fine condition. The cards are thin and damage easily. The result is that it may require sorting through thousands of cards to obtain a single complete set of even one of the common series. That is why discriminating bidders in Mail Sales are often buying groups of the same series in each sale. Fortunately, they have no trouble in disposing of the duplicates as they can be entered in a following sale - often with but little loss in money for the bettering of condition. If everyone insisted on buying only perfect sets, there would be but few sales made. This all makes the actual value of a 20th set in fine condition quite a lot more than the catalog figures indicate. These remarks also apply to a number of the 19th issues on thin cardboard.

POST CARDS AND PLAYING CARDS

The BULLETIN covers ALL kinds of cards, although we sadly neglect the two big non-insert groups of post and playing cards. This is because each of these are quite well organized and have their own societies and publications which are in a position to handle such matter to the best advantage. Our subscription list has, however, from the beginning included a loyal group of those collectors who specialize in one or the other of these groups.

Collecting these cards differs greatly from the inserts. Little can be done in the way of checklists. There is a continual stream of new issues, although getting the older ones entails the same sort of searching as is done for insert and advertising cards. The popular method of collecting is via exchanging. This entails considerable correspondence and develops the social side of collecting with its pen

pals and far-away friendships which are enjoyed by so many.

POST CARDS have several small independent publications such as THE POST CARD TRAVELER, THE ELBEN CARD COLLECTOR, and THE COMBINED JOURNAL in addition to the official gazette, published by the Society. The latter recently gave some new data on post card values as follows:

"In general, cards printed prior to 1900 are worth 3¢ to 10¢ each, with a few which run considerably higher; cards printed between 1900 and 1920 range from 2¢ to 5¢ each on the average; cards since 1920 from 1¢ to 3¢ each average." This probably refers to view cards largely, as we understand that the greetings, comics, and sentimental types are in little demand. Certain subjects like Bridges, Ships, Lighthouses, etc are best.

In PLAYING CARDS the secretary of the Association has just had the revenue law clarified and gives details in the current issue. Any cards can be EXCHANGED legally without payment of tax. But any group of cards up to 54 must have the 13¢ tax paid if SOLD. This is true whether the cards constitute a playing deck, are all of one kind, or any combination whatever. Consequently, dealers are now selling in groups of 54 and affixing a cancelled 13¢ revenue stamp. Few will mind paying this small charge, especially for clean, quality cards.

188. Cell.Buttons #7 - FLAGS (Sweet Caporal,Betw. on the Acts).

Divided into 3 types. Type A is a distinct series with the country name in tall thin letters. Errors have been seen of Japan (red stripe instead of circle) and Madagascar (without blue stripe). Type B contains the bulk of the buttons, many in two or more designs as listed. "c" after the quantity number indicates the old style closed back button. Type C is a slightly larger, flatter button coming both open and closed back (designated "o" and "c"). This is the old style with the pin soldered on instead of being on a bent wire.

A fourth or "D" series was issued by Admiral cigarettes. It is easily identified by the flag being flat instead of waving. Only 4 designs have been seen: Gt. Britain (man of war), Italy (man of war), Servia, Tunis.

(Old Pepsin Gum buttons are not included in this list. Many of these have only the "Whitehead & Hoag" labels. They can usually be identified by the patent date printed at the bottom of the button.)

This listing is given to give collectors an idea of the scope of this button series and show what a fairly large collection may contain. There will be many additions, especially in the old type pins.
