CATALOG NOTES

Most BULLETIN readers now have their copy of the new Catalog, and orders are coming in at a satisfactory rate, although publicity to date has been mostly of the "one friend tells another" type - which is a most effective kind and much appreciated. One defective copy has been reported, and any such should be returned for replacement.

An error occured on page I in connection with the British price. What reads "orders of 5" should be "orders at 5/-". The printer evidently was not familiar with English coinage and could not believe the copy was right. This item, like some of the other slips noted below, was a last minute insertion and did not get proof read. The slightly higher price in England is due to additional postage costs of remailing and for publicity costs in British mediums which could not be carried at the local rate.

Quite a few additions to the set lists have already been noted but listing of these will be postponed until the next BULLETIN. Just what plan of inserting them is best has not yet been decided. Blank spaces have been left throughout the Catalog but these spaces will not be sufficient in many sections. Cost prohibited the larger spaces we would have liked. Printing was done on a per page price and so blank space cost as much as printed. In fact, blank spaces left cost some \$75.

The new Catalog has been generally well received. Greatest praise

The new Catalog has been generally well received. Greatest plate has come from those who are seeing such a catalog for the first time. It is only natural that those who have been using the 1939 edition for the past seven years should be a bit confused by the many changes. However, all admit that the changes had to be made and that the best method has probably been used. A little more use will familiarize all with the new style and numbering and make the old one entirely obsolete.

Although he hasn't kicked about it, one collector asked for more Indexes, and didn't get even one. We thought the Table of Contents just about covered this need, and when we tried to prepare another findex we decided it of so little value as to hardly worth while. A glance at page 3 will usually tell where is what. It will also show the distinguishing letter for types, as T for Twentieth Tob, C for Canada, A for Albums, E for Early Candy, etc. Most of these have a direct tie-up although it was impossible to make C stand for Canada, coffee, candy and other things. One collector thinks a straight ABC

from front to back would have been better, but it is doubtful.

Criticism of the price ranges for one or two types of cards has been made and all such comments will be taken up ar advisement. We believe the stated prices should be given a fair trial before making changes. Many factors enter into value taking and some require a time trial

before any accurate decision can be made.

One critic liked the general style and make up of the 1939 catalog in preference to the new one. As previously stated, it was impossible to continue the loose leaf binding and one-side-of-sheet printing at this time. We presume that search and money could find printers who will do anything, but ordinary printers cannot duplicate that 1939 style which was really a custom job. We were unable to find anyone who could punch those binding holes and we personally had to carry all of those catalogs 32 miles where we could drill the holes on a drill-press using a special jig which we made, and then inserted them in the binders ourselves. At present, we havent the time for such work. Another factor was weight. The new catalog goes a nywhere domestic for 4¢ and foreign 6¢. A fraction of an ounce more weight would mean zoned rates of 5¢ to 11¢ domestic and 14¢ foreign-greatly increasing mailing costs.

We preferred to keep the selling price to a minimum, obtaining a possibly wider distribution, rather than satisfy a few who would glady have paid a price of \$2. or more for a more expensive product. Even before the war most Catalogs of this type sold at \$1. to \$2. Actually the selling price of 75¢ is figured so close that it lettle more than covers the cost of production and mailing, leaving ads to pay publicity.

And Pictures - how we would have liked a hundred of them, but their absence is understood when we point out that the four used cost just about \$48 to publish. But not all problems involved cost. Cover material, for instance. The printer could supply nothing at all suitable a nd we searched five wholesale paper houses to find the leatherette material used a nd which was the very best grade obtainable.



GOODWIN'S BASEBALL PHOTOS While Kinney's photo Actresses have been credited as the longest series of American cards, some doubt of this is shown on examingtion of Goodwin's Baseball series. The question is, should these be considered as a single series. They appeared over a course of three years with new names and poses appearing each year. Some collectors may choose to call them three series, although separating them into the three yeardates would be a job for Soloman and probably is quite impossible.

The Checklist now shows 695 names and is probably nearly complete in that respect. However, some players are known in as many as nine poses and there are other minor variations in details. Largest known collection contains II69 entirely different photos plus about I40 of the minor variations. It lacks I46 names. As there are several known collections of these cards ranging from 500 to 1000 or so each, it is apparent that a combination of them all would total close, and possibly more than the 2000 actresses, as additional names and poses still turn up with great frequency whenever a fresh lot is checked.
