VARIETIES AND ERRORS

It is not uncommon in all types of cards to find varieties which differ in some manner from the normal. It is usually difficult, however, to determine the exact origin of such things without knowing a great deal about the printing process used and the history of the piece. Without being technical, a few notes may serve to show the possible

origins and assist in more complete identification.

As everyone fariliar with printing knows, it is seldom possible to start the presses and immediately turn out the perfect finished article. Trials and arjustments are the usual order, and the floor around the press soon is deeply covered with printing monstrosities of every description. This is PRINTERS WASTE and as the name implies, is only intended to be sold as waste paper. Even after presses are running smoothly, a nut may loosen or an ink line dlog and we have cards with a color missing or some other defect. This is more Printers Waste, but a little of it may be overlooked and in some way reach the public.

But before printing starts, we have PROOFS. These are pulled at every stage, and in the case of colored pictures, there are plate proofs for each color used in the finished picture. There are proofs of each color and combinations of two or more colors as may be necessary to perfect the job. Proofs may be kept on file by the engraver and copies sent to the issuer for approval or changes. They are not intended to reach the public but often years later when files are cleaned they come to light and reach the hands of collectors. Then, too, so meone engaged in the work may want to keep a personal souvenir of the job or may have a friend who saves such pictures and so, sooner or later, more proofs and waste reach collectors. Proof sheets may show any number of designs. Small 19th tobaccos were usually printed I2 to I5 per sheet, standard recent gums 12 or 24 per sheet, playing cards 54 per sheet. If backs are printed and the sheets cut into dindividual designs on a outter they may be difficult to distinguish from the normal card.

ERRORS are somewhat different. These are mistakes which go undetected through part or all of the process. They may be hard to identify unless they are corrected and collectors can thus show both the error and the corrected card. Common errors are the transposed titles,

wrong backs, mispelled words, and omitted inscriptions.

Possibly after considerable printing of a series, some design is found unsatisfactory. It may be changed or a completely new design substituted. Maybe an extra design or two was made from the start, with the idea of discarding to the desired quantity - and then the discarding was overlooked. So, in one way or other we may find, for instance, 5I or 52 cards in what was insended as a 50 card series.

The quantity printed may not be sufficient and more are ordered. Here there may be trouble in accurately matching the colors first used. Thus we get varieties of color shade. Such varieties, however, may more likely be due to exposure of the card to sunlight at some time during its existance. Very often only one color is affected. Gases of various sorts will also affect colors greatly.

CUTOUTS can usually be easily identified if from the usual sources, but they also be made by cutting up small display cards and other misc-

ellaneous advertising matter about which nothing is known.

REPRINTS are usually considered as prints made from the original

plates but at some time after the cards are obsolete. Thus many early A&G plates were used around I9I2 for early candy cards. This was, of course, a reprint of the picture only and not a copy of the entire card. The inscriptions were not used. It is not likely that the original plates now exist for any but possibly the very latest card issues and probably the too, have been scrapped during the war time shortage of metals and so modern reprints can be eliminated as possibilities.

If new plates are made and exact copies of originals attempted, we have imitations, facsimilies, counterfeits, and other bugus productions. These can usually be detected by careful examination, but so far nothing has occured in this line as far as known. The high cost of such work,

plus risk of detection, makes it a hazardous undertaking.

The big wonder is that more of these varieties and errors are not found, especially in the high speed, mass production of 20th century cards. Of those known, some few may have slipped through inspections and been issued in the normal manner but most of them probably come from old files and through employees who worked on their production. It is a credit to these people that so few have survived in that way

There is no standard valuation for these items. Proof sheets of early series usually sell at \$2. to \$5. each. Errors depend on popularity and seldom are worth more than double the normal value. Cutouts with a few exceptions, have no value. The value is seldom much above normal for such things as one color omitted, color changes, titles omitted, shade varieties, double printed backs, changes in positions of title, cutting errors, etc.etc. collectors usually save these things as interesting curiosities, but not as valuable pieces. The Catalog mentions most of the major errors known and some of the other varieties, but any large collection will contain many others not recorded, and others are being found all the time.

The back side says there are photographs of 500 beautiful women and prominent men in this collection. They are now listed as #W40 but this would seem incorrect now. What do you know about these cards?
