Just after reading our few words on early digaratte cards in the last Bulletin, Mr. C.G. Sturtevant ran across a most interesting article along the same lines which he has sent to us. We are fortunate in knowing Mr. Sturtevant as his work as National Historian of the Circus Fans Association brings him constantly in touch with early historical matter The article in question appeared in the NEW YORK MERof all kinds. CURY of Sept. 24, ISS7. The METCURY, which is submeaded as "The leading literary and amusement journal" started in V839 and had a very large circulation. It was a weekly publication of newspaper format, covering theatres, amusements both local and traveling, and literary and sports

reviews of the week.

More than a full column is given under the heading CIGARETTE PHOTOS and the subhead "An objectionable nuisance that comstock will suppress". Continuing: "The vigorous warfare waged by the MERCURY about a year ago against the vulgar photographs that filled the windows of cigar stores as advertisements for certain brands of cigars and cigarettes drove the disgraceful exhibition from public view. But the cigar and cigarette manufacturers who depended on these pictures to sell their goods did not give up their methods. They had the photographs which public opinion forced them to withdraw from view copied in small sizes, and one of these was placed in every five-cent box of cigarettes."

The MERCURY reporter goes on to report on the extent to which such pictures harm the youthful mind and then quotes the laws governing the matter. As enforcement of the law is the special province of Mr. Anthony Comstock, it next interviews that gentleman, who expressed his determination to enforce the laws. He said that he did not prefer to harm the local tobacco dealers who were, in a way, innocent, but intended to strike at the manufacturers where the evil started. matters had been delaying a start, but a beginning would soon be nade and a new poen of campaign would quickly end the corrupt pictures.

The reporter next interviewed representatives of some of the tobacco manufacturers. Some said they intended to give up the pictures as rapidly as possible. Most of them defended the practice on the grounds that they were forced to use the pictures or lose business to firms who They said they selected only pictures that were passable did use them. a nd rejected any obscene ones, although admitting that many of them were copied from the pictures which had been banned from the cigar store windows. They insisted that small boys will get such things anyway and why didn't the cranks arrest the ballet girls in the theatres who were

guilty of just as serious crimes.

continuing: "The manager of the New York branch of a Virginia firm said their house is the first to put up cigarettes in boxws and to put some attractive card or picture with them, but they had kept as far away from valgarity as possible. 'If there was a law against the placing of any kind of picture in cigarette boxes I am sure the firm would at once obey it. I have heard them say that if they had to use indecent pictures to sell their goods they would never sell another box '".

This Virginia firm was probably Allen & Ginter as it is not likely that any other firm from that state was lar ge enough to have a New York branch office. From this article it would seem that we can conclude that that the photo actresses had (I) a direct relationship with the

earlier store advertising cards and (2) were started not earlier than I886. We cannot conclude, though, that these actress photos were the first cigare to cards in America, so ther "unobjectionable" designs may have appeared earlier. The Hall issues have been in this class as while mostly actresses, they were largely dignified portraits and not leg-art photos. Also, these little cigars, or all-tobacco cigarettes as they were then called, (Between the Acts) escaped entirely the fierce vituperation which was hurled at the paper covered smokes. (Incidentally, isnt the word "cigarette" French for little cigar or short cigar?).

We do not know how the Comstock compaign worked out but have never heard of any great battle. We rather think that the manufacturers side-stepped the matter by eliminating the objectionable photos and shifting to other lithoed designs. In fact, when this MERCURY article appeared Goodwin had already been issuing their famous Baseball Players for three months and Kinney must have started their Military Series. In April of the next year A&G and Duke came out with their Flags of Nations and Rulers and Arms sets. Photo actresses were issued at later dates but mostly, if not all, in acceptable designs. The gay gals had done their job of popularizing cigarettes and manufacturers could carry on with designs which would break no laws.

During the past year the English press has contained numerous items pertaining to the earliest cigarette card issues. Some are largely a more or less accurate rehash of other writings and are obviously intended for popular consumption. Such articles dwell on the rarity and value of certain cards and are prone to reflect the writers opinions and desires rather than true research. Here we find unqualified statements that British cigarette cards were issued before 1878 and such things that are easier to say than to prove. Even the more research-minded writers seem to allow conjecture to figure too strongly in their

conclusions at times.

One writer mentions A&G (virginia Brights) cards inscribed "Crop of I883" and "Crop of I884". We have seen these inscriptions on the boxes but not on the cards. Another A&G (Little Beauties) card recently written up is one showing an actress and with a bit of verse on the back relating to the hanging of the bell in St.Pauls, which happened in I881. Without examining the card we cannot give it an opinion, but if this is a real insert it would seem to be in the same class as the Hall Presidents mentioned in the catalog. The writer also states that the card was printed in London as the printing method (Woodburytype) was not used in America. In this he may be wrong, as we have a most attractive advertising card of Weaver & Pennock, a big Philadelphia plumbing house, measuring about 24 by 44 and with a picture on both sides — one of them showing the firm's place of business. Underneath each picture in fine print is, on the left "Woodburytype" and on the right "Am.P.R.P.Co., Philda." The pictures seem as clear as when made.

As we have said, this research work, while interesting, will not materially affect collecting - exen if the most conclusive facts are uncovered, and such facts may never be uncovered beyond doubt.

UNNUMBERED SERIES OF TOBACCO CARDS

irs. N.D. Keeves of London has just published a booklet of the above title. It lists over IOO sets of cards, including some American Tobacco and other American sets. There are 62 pages and it sells for one dollar. Mrs. Keeves has sent us a few copies and we will be glad to forward them to American collectors as long as they last, at the dollar price, or orders may be sent directly to Mrs. Keeves at 29 Colville Terrace, Bayswater, London W.II, England.

The above booklet contains notice of a WHOLE WORLD CARD CATALOG to be published by Capt. A.B.Keeves, son of hrs.veeves. This is planned as a two volume work to cost about 8. The January issue of CIGARETTE CARD NEWS also contains notice of a similar whole world card catalog to appear this year and published by THE LONDON CIGARETTE CARD CO., who have published the Standard Catalog for years. This will be in five parts, one of which will be illustrations, and will also sell for about \$8. The first printing of 500 numbered and autographed copies is being sold by subscription with payment half with order and balance when ready. It is said that this first edition is rapidly being taken up. This will be a monumental work of the largest kind for card collecting.

PUBLICITY. The St.Petersburg (Fla.) Times of Feb 23 varried a fine photograph and writeup of Walter E. Corson from which we learn that his collection now numbers over 4I,000 items including 237 complete sets. Thats a lot of cards, and now we are wondering when it will be possible for us to view this assemblage ourselves. We wish, too, that our own collection was "systematically sorted and arranged" like Walters. A frecent letter from him gives us several new sets and notes for additions to the Catalog and checklists and states that he expects to soon be moving Northward again after a pleasant winter at St.Petersburg.

Dr. Kurnik reports a number of new thirds, including an additional set in the large hide shaped leathers. We presume that all of these sets were prepared although the quantity issued must have been very small as not much more than a half dozen in all are now known. After all, one had to do a lot of smaking to get the necessary coupons. For still more coupons they could be had framed under glass and one such is known.

Across the country in Seattle, Vic White has found what he thinks is one of the fabulously unknown (8 square feet) leather premiums. At least it is the right size and shape and is an actress or girl design, although there is no name or number by which to give positive identification. It looks like the real thing, and we hope it is, because Vic is the sort of guy you always hope the best for as he is pulling that way for you all the time. Another find of Vics is a card by N. Kinura & Co, which is probably a Japanese issue although we dont find that name in any catalog which we have. It pictures a Wildcat, somewhat similar to the one in C40 and so the firm may be one with a British affiliation similar to the Murai cards which have an American connection.

New sets of American tobacco issues are turning up rather sparsely nowadays but Mr. Bray reported a new set of Playing Cards (similar to the Moore & Calvi's) in our last issue, and in this one he reports what must be an extremely rare Kinney series - the Set 3, similar in type to the #210 and 211 sets. The set I are fairly common, but Set 2 is scarce

as we still lack nine of them, and now Set 3, with one known.

Brittish sources report that Chesterfields which were purchased in 1943 in the native stores of Tangier and adjacent Spanish areas carried a short series of cards showing U.S. scenes. Six different are reported, printed in blue and in the Spanish language. Those purchased in nearby U.S. Army stores had no cards. We inquired of Liggett & Myers and the reply was that they had packed no inserts in Chesterfields and that they knew nothing about the cards in question.
