Dear Mr. Barker,

It was most kind of you to send me your list of Goodwin 172. Actually I had seen a copy because I happened to call on Charlie Bray and he showed me his copy.

I have a good many of these cards, including the following additions to your list:

- 1) 073 Ferguson (Phila)
- 2) 098 Fogarty (Phila)
- 3) 127 Mack (Washington)

I found your list most interesting and it proves that there was a regular list of numbered cards. I expect you saw my article on all the Goodwin Photo series in the "Cartophilic World" early this year, in which I illustrated one of each type. If you did not see this I will send you a copy.

When preparing these baseball lists I would like to remind you that there are collectors of these cards outside America who do not understand some of your abbreviations. For instance no Englishman would readily understand what BRK means. Experience in recording cards leads me to the view that if there is to be a comprehensive list of Goodwin 172, we shall have to show all the varieties on one list and set out the captions exactly as they occur on the cards. I am afraid, also, we shall have to show short descriptions in the cases where the same player occurs in half-a-dozen different poses. This is difficult to do unless you have

experience in it, as many of the pictures are quite similar. However, it can be done and to demonstrate the point I will have a go at these Goodwin cards when I get a chance to spend some time at the Museum with Jeff Burdick's cards and when I am out at Charlie Bray's house. A combination of these two big collections, plus those I have, should give a very fair base, but can you let me know, when you prepared your list, which were the biggest collections additional to these? I see you list Orem, Wagner, Wilson and Wise. I know Orem and visited him once in California. I gather that he has practically dropped out of card collecting although he still goes for baseball because of his book. In the case of the other three, Wagner, Wilson and Wise, are these collectors co-operative in checking lists of research and have they got a lot of Goodwin 172?

On the same subject of baseball, I am now working on the text of the First Supplement to World Index which I hope to get published in 1963. In it I want to list all the American series which previously appeared in the American Book of Checklists. I have recently been working on the T205 and T206, and enclose the results of my workings. I wonder if you could have a look at these and see whether you can add anything to them, particularly on the T205 silks and art pictures and, as regards T206, the T213, T214 and T215 printings.

If you feel that Wagner, Wilson or Wise would co-operate on these lists, I should be most grateful if you would send them the lists, but please do not send it to anyone who will file them away and take no notice. We have collectors like that over here and I expect you do too.

In both these two listings I have altered some of the descriptions. I had to do this in the case of T205 because some of Jeff Burdick's descriptions were designed for the cards only - it is no good segregating a card as "red and green background" for the list has to be used for the silks where there are no backgrounds at all. This point will be quite clear to you when you look at the list.



There is no possible question that any new subjects in T206 can come to light and therefore no descriptions are needed except in the cases where more than one portrait occurs of the same subject.

I have made my comments on your listing of Goodwin 172 and I fully expect you to retaliate and criticise my two listings!

Dear Mr. Barker,

I mentioned some months ago that I would prepare a reference work on the early baseball cards. You may have noticed in the "Cartophilic World" that the Society has been publishing various "cartophilic typed listings" and the early baseball cards seemed to me to provide a good subject for one of these. I enclose the first draft of the text and should be very grateful if you would have a look at this and check over your cards, tell me what you think of it and let me know of any additions.

I should also like to know how many copies of an eventual properly typed job, with a semi-stiff cover, could be disposed of in U.S.A. at, say, \$1 per copy. The Society doesn't want to make any money out of this kind of thing, and the dollar is really to recover the cost.

This listing has been based entirely on the cards themselves which I had in front of me, and as such this is also my wants list. If you have any spares and would like to exchange, I have several hundred duplicates.

The descriptions will probably make you smile on occasion, being prepared by a Britisher, although I must confess to being quite a baseball fan, having attended most of the World Series in New York over the last eight years including the two this year when I lost heavily on backing the Yankees!


I expect you will also be amused to see my findings about there being two numbered sets. I may be wrong on this, but it seems too much of a coincidence that

the Pugilists fit in with the long series of baseball, although the pugilist at No.41 in List 2 seems to be out of place. I must emphasise that every single one of these numbers is absolutely clear, having been checked under a strong magnifying glass. When making any additions, please indicate if the number is not clear - the descriptions will then help us to check up on it.

Finally I am wondering whether you could circulate this listing to any of the baseball collectors who you feel could and would help. The cards in Charlie Bray's collection have been covered in this list, and the only other person I am sending a copy to is Fred Baum, so that he can check Jeff Burdick's cards in the Museum.


Further to my letter of 29th October, I enclose photostat copies of the following:-


I note that you will be sending the Goodwin list to M.H. Wise. I have been in touch with him direct although I have not mentioned these listings, so hope you have some luck with him.


Dear Mr. Barker,

Dear Mr. Barker,

After a delay of some months, I have now completed work on the redrafting of the listing of Goodwin Baseball cards, and I wanted to write and tell you how much I appreciated the work you put in on the list.

It was a long and tedious task to prepare the original list, and equally tedious to sort out the additions. Yours were extremely clear and easy to understand, and so were those submitted by Mr. Wise. The longest additions came from Jeff Burdick's collection, which were prepared by Fred Baum, and although he spent weeks on preparation, he is not entirely well equipped to assist on a job like this and as a result we shall miss a few subject until I can get around to studying the cards themselves in the Museum. However, the resultant list will be quite a useful addition to our cartophilic knowledge and may even be of interest to some of the baseball card collectors in U.S.A.

You did not comment on my method of listing the cards so that every different picture of the player has a separate number, but variations in caption are given (a), (b) (c) etc. sub-divisions. This is the principle we have used on all the cartophilic work which I have done over here, and caters for the collector who only wants one picture of each subject, irrespective of the caption.

This brings me to the subject of exchanges. I have quite a lot of duplicates and a good many cases where I hold subjects with captions in two or more styles. In case you would like to make an exchange, I enclose my wants list of the two main series, and if you can let me have any of them I shall be only too pleased to reciprocate with any you need.

Finally there is one query. You have added:





A few months ago I posted you, from New York, copies of two typed listings, Nos. 12 and 14. I wonder if they ever reached you?





Dear Buck:

I trust you came through the holiday all in one piece and that you are in the mood for some talk. I spent the last 6 days in a most interesting fashion. I painted the kitchen and pantry which in reality is now my "office". Ceiling egg shell white and everything else Orange ice a beautiful semi-pastel with a very soothing effect. Perfect job considering the inexperience of the mechanic.

I am now ready to tackle the basement including the floor. Red has the distressing habit of aiming at the walls and today he extended his reach to the girls beds upstairs. Oh well he is still a puppy and I can afford to be a little tolerant as I have had a steady stream of middle size orders for the junk I advertised in my December sales letter.

No doubt you got and studied Bailey's double reply. I am going ahead with my 114 selections and I am pleased that at least we got the 20¢ price no matter who ordered what. Especially because Bruce doesn't seem to be a source any more. Otherwise all quiet and no news from Atlantic. As you may have read the big merger with Sinclair is due for final board action on Dec 30th so maybe Mr. Miller is on special assignment and no winners till January.

Once I start really working I need a lot of time to unwind so right after I stowed all my stuff back in to the pantry I tackled the enigma of T 210 Red borders. I reread all the material and started to do some digging. As you may recall you gifted me with the 1911 Reach guide over a year ago. I finally got around to doing a little checking and discovered something quite amazing. First the genesis of my thought.

As you may recall Mc Clure came up with two new ones bringing the present total to 611. Marcan in Birmingham Series 8 and Carney in Charleston Series 4.

One of my weaknesses is a classic desire for symmetry, even in bb card sets so I started with the assumption that additional cards have turned up for every series except # 2, Virginia Lg. since the publication of Bray's list.

Next I checked over Series 4 and Series 8 (Southern) where the biggest increases in cards have taken place both in Actual numbers and %. Turning to Series 8 the count is now 106 players. Using Nashville, which has the largest total, ~~17~~ 17, and Chatanooga which had the smallest, 3, up to 9 with my add-ons I checked back against the T211 Green Border listing. All 17 of Nashville are in Green Border None of Chatanooga are in green border. Strange yes? Could it be due to the selling pattern of the different brands. Was the sales pattern perhaps a governing factor in making two distinct sets? Or was the marking on Green Border "First Series" 1 to 75, indeed an accurate depiction of what had occurred? I think the latter is the case. If you look at the long unbroken number chain # 36 to 81 that are in green Border you will note that my add ons ~~xxxx~~ ~~Burch~~, Phillips and Thomas Port. all fall within.

So going to the next step. if 75 count represents first series (Less any Chatanooga) How big is 2nd series additions in Red Borders and why?

Even better why add a portrait of Thomas in Montgomery? Well if you dig symmetry and have a 1911 guide you may see why. Digging through the batting averages and using short timers that are pitchers here is what I came up with.

Atlanta: Presently 13; Possibles. Berkle, De Haven, Flaherty, Johns, Keiber, Mathhews (6) Pot. Total 19

Birmingham Presently 15 Possibles Ellum, Coveleskie, Mc Gilvray, Messinger, Ryan (5) Pot Total 20

Chatanooga Presently 9 Possibles, Graham, Hart, Higgins, Johnston Lister, Meek, More, Perry, Siever, Schlitzer Sparks (11) Pot Total 20

Memphis Presently 11 Possibles, Altman, Baerwald, Coleman Goodwin, Gyglic, Klowitter, Knotts Mc Graw. Swalm Wanner (10) Pot Total 21

Montgomery Presently 14 incl 2nd Thomas Possibles, ^{Dietz} Burnett, Duggleby Guesse, Osteen, Whiteman, Yohe (6) Pot total 20!!!!!!!!!!!!

Mobile Presently 12 Possibles Alcock, Colsson. Fisher, Manuel, Murphy Reed, Seitz Shannon Watson (9) Pot Total 21

Nashville Presently 17 Possibles Schwartz Viebahn (2) Pot Total 19

New Orleans Presently 15 Possibles, Barr, Butcher, Dugey, Mitcheel Weimer (5) Pot Total 20.

Now at this point you may be saying Solon is flipped out. Any fool knows that the player limit on these teams was 20 or 21 or whatever. But the strings of !!!!!!! after Montgomery refers to the 2nd Thomas card and even more !!!!!!! when you add up the league total possibles and get and even 160!!!!!!!!!!!!!! Ok for perfect symmetry you would need 20 each team. Wx

Will this analyses stand in say Series 4 ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Virginia Vix Valley which was as you pointed out a strange mixture of College boys and semi pros etc. ????

Let us examine what evidence we have. 1. two teams not known in the series; Parkersberg and Ash, Cat whatever that stands for. 2. No batting records in reach only a team picture of Pt Pleasant. 3. Longest list Charleston 15 cards Shortest a tie between Montgomery and Pt Pleasant 10 each.

Now lets look at Pt Pleasant; Presently 10, Possibles 9 as follows Francis, B. Henry, D. Henry, Hunt, Hutchinson, Jarrett, Mack, Mc Clintock, Waters Making a pot total of 19 Let us however assume that it satys at 4 teams and 15 is the total for each Presently 47 known Possibly 60 total

Now compare this with Series 8. 106/160 up 48% 47/60 up 29% both of these increases lie withing the ranges of the increases noted so far from Bray's original listing to present time..

The other series are tougher to figure but taking a less mathematical approach I would expect something on this order

Series one. Presently 75 Could stay the same following a 13/12 pattern or could increase to 78

Series 2 I have a hunch this one will really jump I don't like that 88 total staying the same so long. My guess is that it could hit 120

Series 3 Texas League will definitely jump with many Orange borders being found in Ok City Galveston and San Antonio Making possibly 160..... This started out in Brace at 90 is up only 5 to 95 and Southern League by contrast has increase of 26... to 106

Series 5: This one almost complete I think Maximum will be 96

Series 6: This one very interesting as Paris has 2 Kuhlmanns and 2 Schennebergs. and Reach lists no Shelbyville in it. All 3x Shelbyville players started season with Maysville. I make it about 60 total

Series 7 Here is the classic puzzle. Goldsboro shows 19 including a mascot: Wilmington shows 1/ What is the truth? started with 58 now up to 61 my guess will have a tremendous increase to at least 90 cards.

Conservatively I expect the set to reach 220 cards by 1980 How does that grab you?

Other Notes: I have Kircher Winchester but not in Shelbyville wonder if same card?

I have compiled Names for some of other series besides 4 and 8. Will send copy if interested.

That's it for this session.


